Legacy:

Large, unique family plots and columbaria; heritage sites and historic sections; an opportunity to share the family stories and unite loved ones in memory.

Elegance:

Beautiful glass niches display urns personalized to reflect a life story.

Traditional:

In-ground burial in landscaped sections to commemorate a life well-lived.

Tribute:

A marble niche in a Garden Court or Mausoleum features engraved names, dates, and photo medallion.


Memorial:

Memorial options include: inscribing a name on a Memory Tree, designing a Memorial Bench, lighting a Memorial Candle, donating one of the Stations of the Cross, or placing a name on an existing family monument.

Cremation is not the end. Just as the full body is placed in a grave or crypt, the cremated body should be treated with respect as well.



Questions and Answers

Q. What is cremation?

A. Cremation is the reduction of the body of a deceased person to recoverable bone fragments through a process that combines intense heat and evaporation. The fragments are then pulverized becoming what we call "cremated remains".

Q. I thought the Catholic Church didn't allow cremation?

A. At one time the church did not approve of the practice of cremation because of its historical ties to the persecution of Christians and a rejection of the belief in resurrection. However, today the Church recognizes that people choose cremation for a variety of reasons that are not in conflict with the church's teachings of life, death, and resurrection. The Church not only allows cremation but also has developed a specific liturgy for Masses with the cremated remains present, Memorial Masses and Committal Services. Your Catholic Cemetery provides a wide variety of placement and memorialization options designed specifically for cremated remains.

Q. Does Holy Cross own a crematory?

A. No. Your Funeral Director will arrange for the cremation with a local crematory.

Q. Do I need to purchase an urn?

A. Cremated remains are required to be placed in a durable container after cremation. Holy Cross offers a variety of urns so that you may choose one that is personalized and meaningful. Because there are so many different places throughout the cemetery for cremated remains you will need to check with a Family Services Advisor to determine what size and style urn will fit in the grave or niche you select.
